

Directions:

- N.B. Trains only stop at Berney Arms on particular services upon request. The walk passes through grazing marshes where cattle or sheep may be present.
- 1 From Berney Arms station take the path across the grazing marsh towards Berney Arms Mill, which is approximately 600m to the south east, passing through kissing gates and gates.
- 2 Upon reaching the mill, walk through the pedestrian gate and up a few steps to the right of the mill. This brings you onto the bank of the River Yare.
- 3 Turn left, passing between the mill and the river.
- 4 After approximately 400m you will reach Berney Arms Inn. To continue the walk, pass in front of the inn and walk through a



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- kissing gate.
- Continue to follow the river bank, taking in the extensive views of Breydon Water to your right and Halvergate Marshes to your left.
- The river bank will lead you through a series of stiles, kissing gates and gates, eventually reaching the outskirts of Great Yarmouth.
- 7 Follow the path under the lift-bridge, where the route will become surfaced. Pass alongside the supermarket car park to arrive at Great Yarmouth station.

Berney Arms Station



Points of interest:

- Berney Arms station is the most remote train station in Britain and is two miles away from the closest public road;
- Birds including pink-footed-goose (winter), marsh harrier, little egret and waders;
- Berney Arms Mill, an English Heritage site;
- Panoramic views of Breydon Water and Halvergate Marshes.
