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Angles Way Bungay

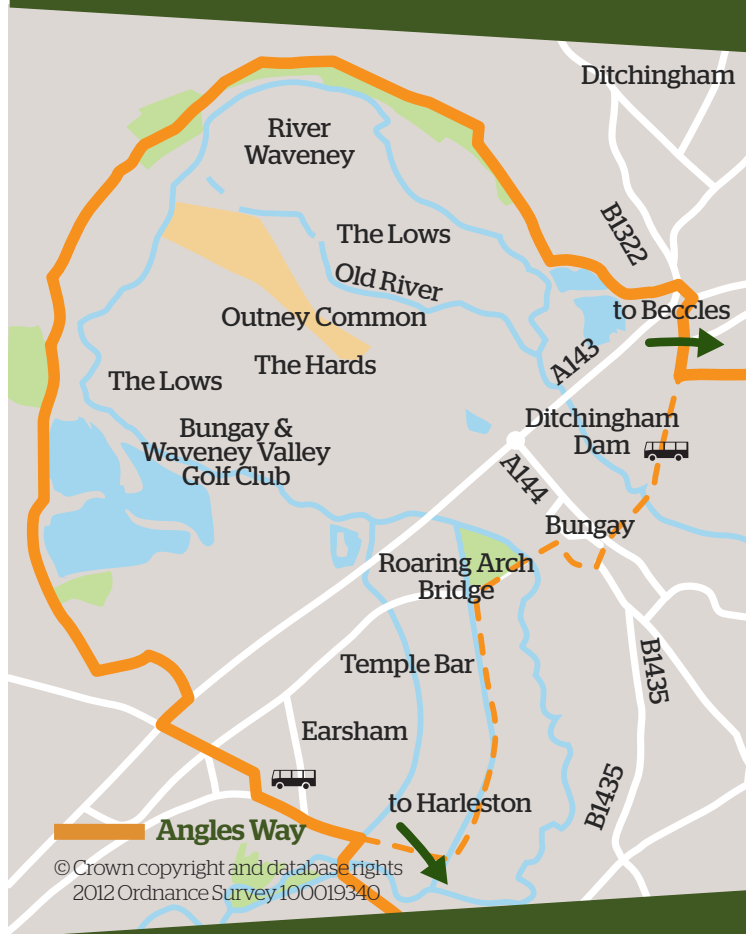

Rich in biodiversity, its many sights are a pleasure to behold come rain or shine. Whether you are looking to tackle the whole of the 93 miles, a five mile stroll on a Sunday afternoon or just one of the many short loops along the way, there's something for everyone.

Thanks to funding in 2012, from the Rural Development Programme for England (RDPE), plans for greater accessibility and improved trail quality have been put in place. These include improved signage, stile-free trail sections and an all-new website packed with updated news and information (visit angles-way.co.uk)

What to see on the trail

Across all seasons, Angles Way walkers can gaze over the Waveney Valley and admire the ever-changing rural patchwork. Check the flooding of the water meadows in the winter, spot the cows grazing the land in summer and admire the diverse wildlife all year round.

Stand beside Bungay Castle's imposing gatehouse towers and gaze up at its impressive Norman walls. Dating back to around 1100, the castle was built by the Bigod family, taking advantage of its prominent position on the protective curve of the River Waveney. Flixton Air Museum, housed on the airfield used by the Bungay Buckaroos bomber squadrons during the Second World War, displays an impressive array of aircraft.

On a hot day when only a paddle will do, Outney Common offers a variety of water-based activities, with high quality water that is popular for canoeing.



Top 5 sights on this trail:

01 Bungay - a market town rich in history.

02 The Buttercross, Bungay's distinctive market centrepiece.

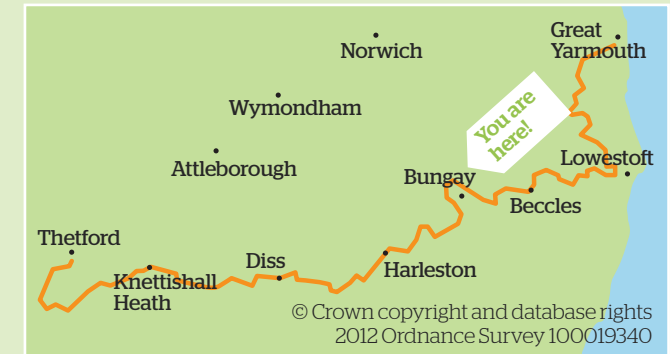
03 Bungay Castle's 13th century remains.

04 An early 19th century silk mill, **Ditchingham Mill**.

05 Relax in **Bath Hills**, once a vineyard for local Lords.

Angles Way's dynamic atmosphere means you can choose a walk to suit your mood. As the Angles Way loops around Bungay in a neat circular walk, enjoy the peaceful seclusion of the countryside towards Thetford, or for a livelier walk, follow the widening river, its boats and holidaymakers, as you approach Great Yarmouth.
