

Route description

This walk has been audited to support people accessing the countryside and to improve quality of life. The walk audit checked for potential accessibility difficulties along the route. Maps are provided showing point numbers which correspond to photos and descriptions of these areas so that you can decide if this walk is suitable for you.

This route is a 2 mile section of Weavers' Way, following the disused Midland and Greater Northern railway line from Felmingham Station car park to the Weavers' Way car park in North Walsham. The trail takes you through the platform area of Felmingham station and then through beautiful views of the Norfolk countryside. As you approach North Walsham town you will reach the Weavers' Way car park on Station Road where the route comes to an end. From this point, you could follow the way marking into North Walsham town centre and catch the bus or train home.

Alternatively, you could begin your route at the car park in North Walsham and make your way to Felmingham from there. Due to the length of the route and the difficult terrain, it is quite challenging for those with mobility and stamina issues. However, the route can be tailored to any distance that is suitable for you and then head back to the start point along the route you have taken.





By car: Felmingham Station car park, NR28 OLL or Public car park on New Road, North Walsham, NR28 9JR






The route begins at Felmingham
Station car park. The surface is
compact gravel which can be uneven
and muddy in some sections




There is a width of 1.5m on the track joining the car park to Weavers' Way, The surface is firm and natural with some loose material on the surface. There is a width restriction of 56cm through the pedestrian gate



The trail width is 15-20cm and the surface is very stony for 6m. Use the track to join Weavers' Way and head east



There is a very muddy section on the approach to the pedestrian gate. The trail width is 15-25cm across for 100m



The trail is not well established after the level crossing and there is a soft grassy surface for 50m



There are tree roots with a 1cm step protruding from the trail for 7m. The split level reduces the trail width to 15-20cm



The trail width is 35-45cm across on either side of the rutted grass



The surface is very stony for 6m. The split level reduces the trail width to 35cm



There is a section that may become muddy during the winter periods for 23m



The surface is very stony for 19m. The trail narrows to 20-35cm across



There is a split level path for 25m which reduces the trail width to 35cm



There are small stones and tree roots protruding 0.5-2.5cm for 18m



There is a split level for 16m reducing the trail width to 20-30 cm across.



There are stones protruding 1-3cm from the surface, with some loose stones for 22m. The trail width increases to 2.5m across



The trail width narrows to 20-30cm across.. There are stones protruding 1-1.5cm from surface for 15m and some loose material. This section can be muddy during winter periods for 30m



The trail width increases to 1-2m across for 25m. There are small stones protruding 1-3cm for 20m



There are stones protruding 1-3cm for 25m. This section can become very muddy for 25m. There is a slight gradient of 1:15 for 1m



The trail narrows to 20-30cm and stones protruding 1-3cm for 100m



The trail width is 40-50cm across due to the split level for 10m



On the approach to the pedestrian gate there is a stony surface for 4m..

There is a width restriction of 1m through the gate. Take care when crossing as there is mud and loose stones on the road and the road can be busy with traffic



There is a 1m width restriction through the gate. There is a slight gradient of 1:15 through the gate. The trail width then increases to 1-2m across for 15m



because of the split level for 11m



The trail width increases to 1-2m across and there are tree roots protruding 2cm for 10m



There are two large tree roots with a 2 -4cm step



The trail narrows to 40-50cm across. The surface is natural, soft and muddy with some loose material



The trail width increases to a width of 1-3m. The surface is firm and natural with some loose material



There is a width restriction of 40-50cm on either side of the rutted grass. There are some large tree roots protruding 3cm



There is a large hole in side of path 20cm across and 10cm deep. Take care when passing



The trail width narrows to 50-60m with muddy sections at intervals.

There are large tree roots protruding 3 -4cm for 15m



The track to the car park is a width of 1.5m for 5m. There are protruding stones with 1-3cm step for 12m



The route ends at the Weavers' Way car park in North Walsham on Station Road. The surface is firm and natural with some loose 20mm gravel. The are some small stones protruding 1cm
