### The Brecks Thetford Architecture



### **Route Summary**

A 2<sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> mile circular walk around Thetford town centre following the Little Ouse river past various historical sites.

> NORFOLK TRAILS

1843 MAHARAJA TO DE SINGH SUCCEEDED HIS FATHER TO THE THRONE OF T SOVEREIGN SIKH KINGDOM OF PUNJAB. HE WAS DESTINED TO BE ITS LAST RULER.

IN 1849 FOLLOWING THE CLOSELY FOUGHT ANGLO SIKIE WARS THE BRITE NNEXED THE PUNIAB DULEEP SINGH WAS COMPELLED TO RESIGN HIS SOVE RIGHTS AND EXILED. IT WAS AT THIS TIME THAT THE KOH-I-NOOR DIAMON LATER TO BE INCORPORATED INTO THE CROWN JEWELS. PASSED TO THE BRITIST AUTHORITIES An urban fringe walk that is 95% surfaced. The route follows the river for the most part. Frequent bridge crossings present the biggest challenge to wheelchair users.

This route has been reviewed to support people accessing the countryside. It was audited and checked for potential accessibility difficulties along the route. Maps are provided on p4 -5 showing point numbers which correspond to photos and descriptions of the route, so that you can decide if this walk is suitable for you.

The walk starts at Nuns Bridges car park and crosses over the River Ouse on the pedestrian bridge. It then follows Spring Walk along the river until it reaches Butten Island. At the island, the route goes north on Bridges Walk. The route then takes Nether Row up Rampart Way past Castle Hill.

At the top of Rampart Way, the walk turns east on Castle Street until the route meets the pedestrianised town centre on King Street. The path continues east under London Road and emerges by the Cluniac Priory. The Priory is accessible and worth a detour. The route loops through Abbey Meadow before crossing back over the river along Haling path to Butten Island.



Start point: Nuns Bridges car park

Distance: 2.7 miles


Accessible facilities: There are accessible toilets on Bridge Street, Cage Street and on Castle Meadow

**By car:** Free car parking at Nuns Bridges and limited spaces at the Priory

**By bus:** Catch the 84 from Bury St Edmunds or a National Express coach from Norwich. The bus station is next to the Priory on Norwich Road

## **Accessibility Information**



Start at Nuns Bridges car park. There is loose gravel (20mm diameter) The footbridge has a gradient of 1:9 and steps of 40mm at either end and for 10m

At the crossing of Nuns Bridges Road, the path slopes at a gradient of 1:10 for 3m and 1:6 for 1m.



Tree roots have made the surface uneven for 200m

The island is unsurfaced but firm. Join Bridge Walk going north. The path is constructed with some loose gravel (20mm diameter) At the second bridge there are two slopes of 1:8 for 5m and 1:10 for 5m

Bridge Walk emerges onto School Lane where there is a step of 30mm and a car park



There is no footway on Nether Row but the road is infrequently used by traffic.



On Rampart Way there is a steep cross gradient of 1:9 for 60m with a drop to one side. Wheelchair users are advised to cross over the road here



There is a good view of Castle Hill from Rampart Way and an optional route through but it is not accessible for all due to adverse gradients



On Castle Street there is a cross gradient of 1:9 for 15m



The pedestrianised King Street (Thetford town centre) has a firm paved surface



Small bridge with squeeze gate (850mm restriction)




At Blaydon Bridge there is a squeeze gate and the surface is uneven and steep (15mm step and 1:10 gradient)



#### Uneven surface for 30m

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The route continues along Haling Path. Take care as there is a cross gradient of 1:10 for 10m by the water

At the bridge to Butten Island there are ramps which measure a gradient of 1:12 on both sides for 40m
