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Introduction

We're very happy to share our updated Norfolk SEND Area Strategy for 2022-23. We have the same four key priorities agreed in 2019 based on the outcomes set out by Norfolk Children and Young People Strategic Alliance (CYPSA).

These priorities keep the focus on making sure Norfolk is a place for every child and young person to FLOURISH no matter what their start in life or what level of help and support they need to achieve their full potential. Having worked closely with the Department for Education this year, we know our local plan fits well with national plans that the Government is likely to set out later this year.

The priorities are:

- Working together with children and young people (CYP) with SEND
- Improving what is in place for families and professionals to support children and young people with SEND
- Communicating the SEND services and support available in Norfolk
- Preparing young people for adult life

In this update we'll be sharing a little more about the work we've carried out so far to improve and transform the lives of children and young people with SEND.

We've been working on 109 separate actions to improve services where Ofsted/Care Quality Commission told us it was most needed, and we await our re-visit later this year.

We've also been doing lots of work to make sure we understand the experience of children and young people with SEND, their parents/carers and the professionals who work with them. More than 1,200 people responded to our wide-ranging SEND survey this year which is helping us build a picture of SEND services and provision across education, health, social care and wider community support and has reassured us that our action plans and improvement work are focusing on the right areas.

Looking forward, it is vitally important that we continue to build on our strengths, trusted relationships and determination to work together, to support children and young people with SEND in Norfolk and change lives together.






Where children and young people with an EHCP are learning in Norfolk


Where children and young people with an EHCP are learning in England

Young people with an EHCP in Norfolk by age range 2021 to 2022




At 16 destinations by SEND students (state-funded mainstream schools)

Changing Lives Together





Working together with children and young people (CYP) with SEND

It is important that the education, health and social care needs of CYP and actions that will help them are identified as soon as possible.

Parents/carers and professionals are supported to work together to understand how they can best help CYP with SEND to learn and develop.

What needs to happen

- CYP and their parents/carers feel confident about sharing their experiences and that these will be used to shape improvements
- CYP are supported to have an active role in decision making
- Communication about services is clear and understood by CYP and their parents/carers and those working with them
- CYP, their parents/carers and professionals work in co-production to develop ways to share information
- Timely and meaningful assessments are used to plan the support needed to enable CYP to progress

When we talk about professionals, we mean the people who work to help and support children and young people with SEND.

An example of recent work:

• improved knowledge, understanding and skills of school staff who work with CYP with SEND through sharing good practice



Improving what is in place for families and professionals to support children and young people (CYP) with SEND

It is important that those who plan and provide services and those who use them work together, ensuring that plans for improvement use all relevant information.

What needs to happen

- All those working with or volunteering to support CYP have the right skills and training for their roles
- Education, health and social care services for CYP are shaped by a strong commitment to co-production
- All services regularly review how they collect, share and use data
- Those who plan services are using resources effectively
- CYP and their parents/carers are part of conversations about SEND support, know what to expect and are included in decision making

When we talk about resources, we mean equipment, buildings, people, time and money.

 CYP and their parents/carers have access to information to be able to make choices when making placement decisions

A few examples of recent work:

- New SEND E-learning module to improve everybody's awareness of SEND and ways of working
- Better information about the provision available in Norfolk schools to help parent/carers make choices
- Developing a new central training framework so all those working with and or volunteering to support CYP have the right skills and training for their roles



Communicating the SEND services and support available in Norfolk

It is important that parents/carers and professionals know how to find out what they can expect, what they can access and how they can all take part in developing plans for improvement.

The Local Offer website is key to sharing SEND information for parents/carers and professionals.

What needs to happen

- Services produce and develop their information in coproduction with children and young people (CYP) and their parents/carers
- Services ensure that information is easy to use and understand, helpful and up to date
- CYP, parents/carers and professionals work together to continuously review and improve the SEND Local Offer website.
- A wide range of communication methods is used to make sure that information is available to everyone who needs it

Preparing young people for adult life

It is important that children and young people (CYP) with SEND are supported from an early age to develop skills that will enable them to increase independence, make choices and plan for their future.

Services are in place to help all CYP with SEND transition successfully into an adult life of their own choosing.

What needs to happen

- CYP are supported to take an active role in their community, including employment and living an independent adult life
- CYP are supported to understand and look after their health and wellbeing
- Education, health and social care services will work together with CYP and parents/ carers to understand and meet the needs of CYP
- Services are shaped by a clear understanding of the needs of CYP and by reviewing the impact of services on their lives
- All CYP and their parents/carers will know where to go for help and support with transition and preparing for adult life

Preparing for adult life (PfAL) outcomes

Norfolk has high aspirations for the futures of all CYP and is committed to achieving the four PfAL outcomes, which are:

- Being healthy
- Having employment
- Being part of your community
 - Independent living

A few examples of recent work:

- An employment action group has been set up to improve pathways to work for young people with SEND
- Exploring a wrap around skill development offer for young people with more complex SEND needs to be offered alongside their Post 16 provision



Action plan

There is an action plan for each of the four priorities

Examples of actions we are working on

Priority 1 – working together with children and young people (CYP) with SEND:

- improve knowledge, understanding and skills of school staff who work with CYP with SEND
- develop guidance to support educational settings to hold person-centred reviews that fully engage CYP with SEND and their families

Priority 2 – Improving what is in place for families and professionals to support CYP with SEND

- A co-produced, accessible training platform will be created to inform and offer development opportunities to those that work or volunteer with children and young people with SEND and their families
- Information regarding SEND provision in Norfolk schools will be improved to support parent/carers, children and young people make an informed decision about appropriate school placement

Priority 3 – Communicating the SEND support and services available in Norfolk

- Promote opportunities for CYP with SEND and their parent/carers to get involved and have their say on a range of subjects
- Promote accessibility to all venues in Norfolk

Priority 4 - Preparing young people (YP) for adult life

- Develop a 'buddy' scheme to support YP with SEND to develop their skills and confidence when they are out and about in the community
- Develop and publish a plan that makes sure that there is Post 16 education to meet current and future needs

Appendix 1: Text description of key information shown in charts

Where children and young people with an EHCP are learning in Norfolk

The bar chart shows where children and young people with an EHCP are learning in Norfolk in 2022 compared to 2021 and 2020. This year:

- 34% were in mainstream school (down 3%)
- 31% were in special school (up 3%)
- 2% were in elective home education (no change)
- 2% were in alternative provision (down 1%)
- 30% were in further education (no change)
- 0.7% were awaiting provision (no change)

Where children and young people with an EHCP are learning in England

The bar chart shows where children and young people with an EHCP are learning in England in 2022 compared to 2021 and 2020. This year:

- 42% were in mainstream school (no change)
- 37% were in special school (down 1%)
- 0.9% were in elective home education (no change)
- 0.8% were in alternative provision (no change)
- 18% were in further education (no change)
- 1% were awaiting provision (no change)

Young people with an EHCP in Norfolk by age range 2021 to 2022

The bar chart showing children and young people with an EHCP in Norfolk by age range. In 2022 there are:

- 318 under-fives (59 more than 2021)
- 2,223 five to 10 year olds (116 more than 2021)
- 2,799 11 to 15 year olds (351 more than 2021)
- 1,966 16 to 19 year olds (70 more than 2021)
- 1,365 20 to 25 year olds (322 more than 2021)



Norfolk SEN primary need breakdown 2020-21 in schools

- Social, emotional and mental health (SEMH) accounted for 22%
- Speech language and communication needs 19%
- Moderate learning difficulty 17%
- Specific learning difficulty 13%
- Autism spectrum disorder 9%
- Sen support but no specialist assessment of type of need 6%
- Other difficulty/disability 6%
- Physical disability 3%
- Severe learning difficulty 2%
- Visual impairment 1%
- Hearing impairment 1%
- Multi-sensory impairment 0.7%
- Profound and multiple learning difficulty 0.3%
