
Adult Learning are here to help and support you with adapting to online working so we have produced this quick guide to make it as easy as possible for you.

# **Being Online**

### How does online learning work?

Online learning works by giving you course material over the internet

- If you have ever used Google searches, you have already used the internet for learning!
- Your Adult Learning tutor will let you know what materials you need and how to find them.
- During the online course, you might complete homework, watch videos, take quizzes etc.

### Have a place to study

Where you study is important to your online learning so take time to prepare it.

Make sure this place is quiet, organised, distraction-free, and available for use when you need it.

Consider turning off your phone and logging off all social networks when studying as they can be distracting.

### Take part in online discussions

Online learning doesn't mean learning alone. Connecting with your classmates in an online classroom will help you to still feel part of a group. Please ensure that you are mindful of your online tone; be respectful if you disagree with other members of your online group.

Don't be afraid to ask questions, your Adult Learning tutor is there to help and support your learning.

### Ask for help when you need it

Please ask your tutor for help if you need it, we don't want you to fall behind. Falling behind might make you feel low and you may not be able to finish the online course - so just ask, we want to help you.

By asking for help you may also help your classmates as they may be having the same problems.

Keep in mind that if you don't ask for help when you need it, your Adult Learning tutor may never know that something is wrong.

#### Don't share passwords

Even for your online learning and not even with your Tutor! Our servers log all kinds of information about out learners, so please keep this secure as we don't want people gaining unexpected access to your information.

### Make sure your equipment is set up comfortably

If you get unexpected messages telling you about that amazing  $\pounds 10,000$  holiday you've won, it's probably too good to be true, so don't open it, delete it!


### Be mindful of things you have in the background
