What is a Safe place?







If you are in any danger call 999.

You use this number if you have been attacked or if you see any crime that is happening there and then.

This could be burglary, shoplifting, fighting in the street and name-calling as some examples.



If you need support to report a crime or bullyingbut you are not in any danger yourself, you must call101, which is the Police Non-Emergency Number.

Who is Safe places for?



Anyone who feels vulnerable.

This might be a person who is lost in a town or city they do not know very well and/or may feel scared that they could be attacked because they have a disability.



Anybody else?

It is also for children aged 11 plus.

Why would you use a Safe place Card?



To get **help** if you feel worried or scared when you are out.

If you need a phone so you can **ask** for help. Please

help me





This could also be if you are being **bullied**.



If someone is **calling** you **names**.



If someone steals from you.



If you are feeling **anxious** or **upset**.



If you are feeling **unwell** or have become **lost**, so you can find your friend or family.



If you have been **mugged** (which means a stranger taking your bag or something else that belongs to you), you can call for help and someone may come to your rescue.

You can also go to the **Police** if you want.

It is your **choice** whatever you **decide** to do.

What will happen?



- Go into the shop or other public place where there is a Safe place logo. You could use the Norfolk Safe place finder website to help with directions.
- Go to the nearest counter and show your Safe place card
- Staff will ask you what the problem is. They can make a phone call for you, or you can use their phone.




